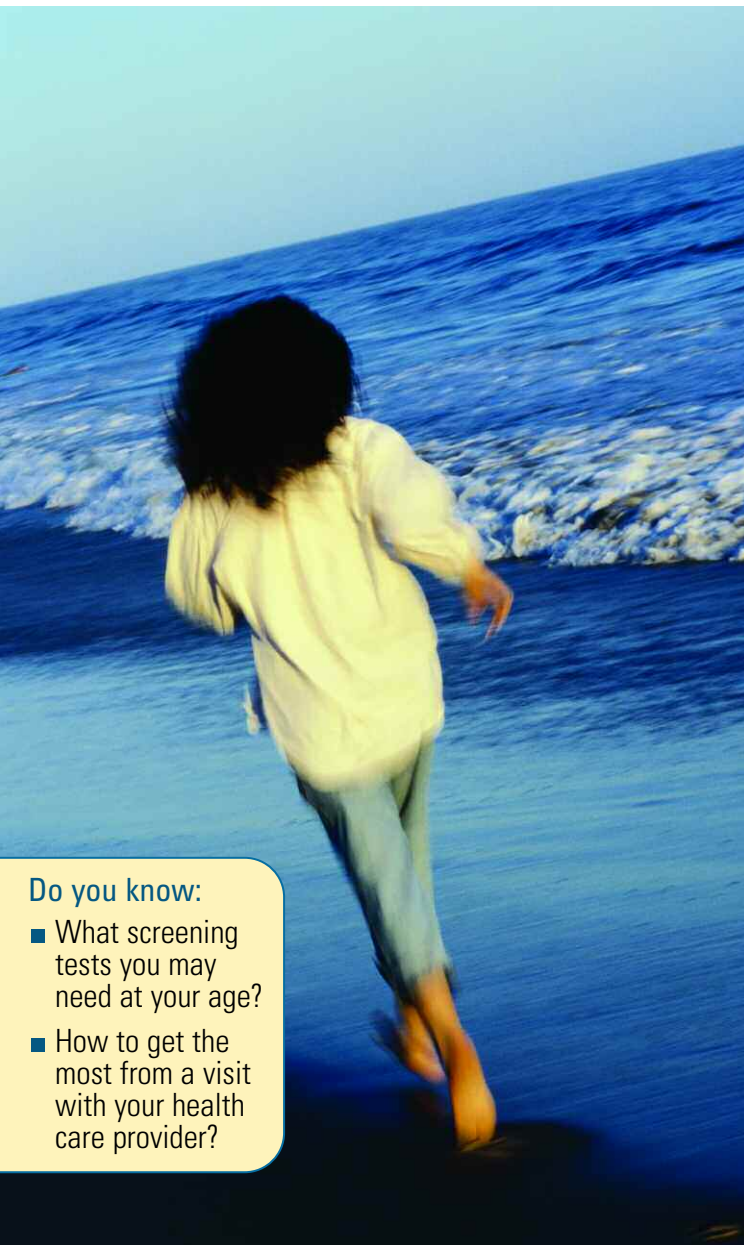

## About Your Primary Care Team

*Your primary care team will work with you. They will care for you and help you take care of yourself.*

Your **Primary Care Physician** (PCP) is the doctor you will call whenever you have a health problem or concern. He or she will also see you for routine physical and gynecological exams. If needed, your PCP will refer you to a specialist. Your PCP directs your care at Massachusetts General Hospital.

Some PCPs work with a **Nurse Practitioner**. A Nurse Practitioner is a licensed, registered nurse with specialized training and an advanced degree. Like your PCP, the Nurse Practitioner can assess and diagnose medical problems, prescribe medicine, develop treatment plans and provide one-on-one patient education. Your Nurse Practitioner works with your PCP to make sure all your healthcare needs are met and that you are as healthy as possible.

## When to call for an appointment?

**For routine physical exams.** You should see a member of your primary care team for your routine physical exam every one to two years. This is a time to talk to your doctor



about your concerns and about healthy lifestyle choices. This visit is important to prevent health problems by screening for diseases.

**For follow-up and urgent care.**

Call any time you have questions or concerns about your health.

You should call for an

appointment whenever you have a new symptom or change that needs urgent attention. You do not have to wait until your next routine physical exam to have your questions answered by a member of your primary care team.

For example, a woman may want an appointment to ask about menopause, contraception, or help in managing a chronic disease like diabetes or high blood pressure. Or a woman may need an urgent appointment for a new problem.

**For emergencies.** In a life-threatening emergency, dial 911.

*It is also important to know how you can ask for medical advice when your primary care team's office is closed. Ask for the phone number to call when the office is closed.*

## Four things to prepare for your appointment

*Take these steps to prepare for your visit to make your appointment more productive.*

**1) Bring a list of questions.** Write down any concerns or questions you have. If you have a problem, write down your symptoms, when they started and anything that makes them better or worse. Share your list with your primary care team.

**2) Bring a list of all medicines you are taking.** Include prescription and non-prescription medicines, vitamins and health supplements. Check to see if you need any prescription refills so you can ask for them at your appointment.

**3) Think about your lifestyle and your health.** Be prepared to talk to your primary care team about how your lifestyle may affect your health. This may include smoking, stress, exercise, nutrition and relationship concerns. If you are concerned about your safety at home or with your partner, you can share this information with your team. All information is kept in strictest confidence. Your primary care team is prepared to help address these concerns.

**4) Be an active member of your primary care team.**

Look at the guidelines in this brochure to know when you may need routine screenings. Talk to your team about the screening tests and timeline that is right for you. Keep a record of the dates of all your screening tests (Pap Test, mammograms and any tests you have). Tell your team about vaccinations you have had and about any allergies you have.
